Nature Notes

Double-Crested Cormorant



This cormorant swims low in the water with its bill tilted slightly upward. In flight it has a distinct crook in its neck.

Cormorants are excellent divers and use their feet for propulsion. They dive for fish, crustaceans and amphibians from the surface. They are able to stay at 1.5-7.5 meters below the surface for 20-70 seconds.

When nesting in trees, the nest is made from sticks and debris and is lined with leafy twigs and grass. They also nest on rocks near the water. These nests are made of seaweed and trash gathered at the water's edge. The nests are built by the female.

Incubation is 28-30 days by both sexes. The young may leave the nest at 21-28 days but may return to be fed by both sexes. Their first flight is at 35-42 days. They are independent at 63-70 days. There is one brood per year.

The population of the Double-Crested Cormorant fluctuates because of persecution at nesting colonies even though the range has expanded, particularly in the interior, in the last two decades of the 20th century. They are often killed by fishermen who believe they compete with them.

COVID-19 NOVEL CORONAVIRUS

The COVID-19 pandemic is still a global crisis and decisions made by leaders and citizens in the coming days will determine both the course of the virus in the short term and when the pandemic will ultimately end. The World Health Organization (WHO) has three messages to share.

First, COVID-19 can be beat with science, solutions and solidarity. More than 66 million cases have been reported worldwide and more than 1.5 million people have lost their lives. Although this global crisis is not over, many countries and cities have successfully prevented or controlled transmission with a comprehensive, evidence based approach.

Second, we must not backslide on our critical health goals. The COVID-19 pandemic is a sobering reminder that health is the foundation of social, economic and political stability.

Third, we must prepare for the next pandemic now. We've seen this past year that countries with robust health emergency preparedness infrastructure have been able to act quickly to contain and control the spread of viruses.

Progress on COVID-19 vaccines gives us all a lift and we can now start to see the light at the end of the tunnel. WHO, however, is concerned that there is a growing perception that the pandemic is over while many places are still witnessing very high transmission rates. This is putting an enormous pressure on hospitals, intensive care unties and health workers.

Some countries have managed to reduce transmission rates by putting very strict measures in place. Even as vaccines are rolled out, people need to adhere to public health measures so that everyone is protected. Please be careful, think of health workers and act for the greater good because it will save lives and livelihoods.

On November 12th the province of Manitoba moved into the Critical level (red) on the #RestartMB Pandemic Response System to

protect Manitoba's citizens. Dr. Brent Roussin, Manitoba's chief provincial public health officer, urges Manitobans to only leave their homes for essential purposes. When leaving the house be sure to physically distance, wear a mask in indoor public places and avoid crowded spaces. Do not leave home if you are sick, or when any member of your family is sick. Do not socialize with anyone from outside your household. Anyone arriving in Manitoba is required to self-isolate for 14 days. Businesses are required to limit the capacity to 25% of the usual capacity. All places of worship are required to close.

On November 21st all in-store sales of non-essential items were banned across Manitoba. Retail businesses were required to remove all non-essential items or limit public access to non-essential items. A listing of the items that are deemed essential can be found online on the Manitoba Government Pandemic Response System Web Page. This public health order is to be in effect until December 11th at which time the order will be reassessed.

Manitoba Premier, Brian Pallister, continues to urge Manitoban to follow health guidelines and change their holiday celebrations to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Pallister acknowledged that this was a difficult thing to ask of Manitobans but hoped he would be respected in the coming years for 'having the guts' to do to the right thing. There will be much to celebrate next year but for the time being the right thing to do is protect each other and stay safe by social distancing, wearing masks, and socializing with people in their own households.


