Nature Notes

Brown Thrasher

This shy bird becomes highly aggressive when defending its young, often charging towards the head of an intruder. The male bird sings from an exposed perch, sometimes quite high. It is able to imitate other birds but most often sings its own song, which is a curious mixture of musical phrases.

Its bright rufous upperparts and heavily streaked underparts distinguish this species from all other thrashers in its range.

Although primarily migratory, Brown Thrashers in the south do not migrate. They live solitary or in pairs. They are highly terrestrial, foraging on or near the ground for food. They find insects by digging with their bills. They eat mainly insects, small amphibians, fruit and some grains. They run quickly on the ground, turn over leaves and moves debris with its bill. They frequent dense brush, ornamental vegetation of suburbs and gardens.

The nest is made of sticks, grasses and dried leaves and is lined with fine grasses. It is in a bush, on the ground or in a low tree, usually 30 cm – 3 metres above the ground. The nest is built by both sexes. The brown thrasher is a solitary nester.

Incubation is about 11-14 days by both sexes. The young are brooded by the female and stay in the nest for 9 – 13 days. They are fed by both sexes. They have 2 -3 broods per year.

The Brown Thrasher is common to fairly common but it is rare in the Maritimes and in the west. It will sometimes tend feeders for raisins, suet and bread.

COVID-19 NOVEL CORONAVIRUS

Eight months into the COVID-19 pandemic, people are tired and want to get on with their lives. Countries want to get their societies and economies going again. This is what the World Health Organization (WHO) wants as well. Stay-at-home orders and other restrictions have taken a toll on livelihoods, economies and mental health.

WHO fully supports efforts to re-open economies and societies. WHO wants to see children returning to school and people returning to the workplace – but this must be done safely. No country can just pretend the pandemic is over.

The reality is that this coronavirus spreads easily, it can be fatal to people of all ages, and most people remain susceptible. If countries are serious about opening up, they must be serious about gaining control over the virus.

There are four essential things that all countries, communities and individuals must focus on to take control. Firstly, prevent amplifying events. COVID-19 spreads very efficiently among clusters of people. Second, reduce deaths by protecting vulnerable groups. Third, individuals must play their part by taking the measures to protect themselves and others – stay at least one metre away from others, clean hands regularly, practice respiratory etiquette, and wear a mask. And fourth, governments must take action to find, isolate, test and care for cases, and trace and quarantine contacts.

Above all, national unity and global solidarity are essential. This virus thrives when we're divided. When we're united, we can defeat it.

On August 19th, the Manitoba government launched the #RestartMB Pandemic Response System, a new public health online tool that connects Manitobans with clear, timely, and more detailed and localized information about the current risk of COVID-19 and the specific measures being taken to reduce its spread.

This tool allows public health officials to effectively communicate specific pandemic changes and related containment measures by site, region or sector. This will allow for targeted measures focusing on containing any outbreaks, instead of applying province wide restrictions. Public health remains a top priority while minimizing impacts on the economy and services.

The #RestartMB Pandemic Response System, the first of its kind in Canada, is based on a series of COVID-19 indicators monitored by public health officials to give a clear and detailed picture of the situation throughout the province. Indicators include health system capacity, public health capacity, risk of outbreaks in vulnerable settings and risk of importation of cases.

The four colour-coded response levels are:

- **(RED)** critical – community spread of COVID-19 is not contained and/or there are significant strains on the health-care system;
- **(ORANGE)** restricted – community transmission of COVID-19 is occurring, measures are being taken to manage the negative impact;
- **(YELLOW)** caution – community transmission of COVID-19 is at low levels;
- **(GREEN)** limited risk – the spread of COVID-19 is broadly contained and a vaccine and/or effective treatment is available.

The Response System outlines steps that should be taken at each response level, as well as public health orders and guidance for businesses, service providers and other sectors. We must learn to live with this virus, and be prepared to both respond and adapt to changes in the transmission risks COVID-19 presents.

Erratic Driving Near Langruth

On August 22nd, just after 6 p.m., Amaranth RCMP received a call of an erratic driver on Highway 50 near Langruth. RCMP officers located the suspect vehicle and speaking with the driver and passenger, it was learned that the driver had just been assaulted with a weapon and they were trying to get away from the suspect.

Officers were provided information where the suspects may be and attended that location. Police located Vincent Richard of Sandy Bay First Nation in a wooded area in Sandy Bay and placed him under arrest. While in custody, police say Richard damaged property belonging to the RCMP and as a result, he is charged with assault with a weapon, mischief under \$5,000, and two counts of failing to comply with a probation order. He was remanded into custody and appeared in court on Aug. 24.


Pine Creek School Division is pleased to welcome Rhonda Michaud to the role of Principal at Langruth Elementary School.
