Municipal Office still Closed to Public

Due to Covid-19, the Municipal office is closed to public walk-in traffic. We will be accepting visits by appointment. If you need to visit the office in person, please call ahead or knock on the front door. We strongly encourage people needing assistance to avoid coming directly to the office, but to contact us by phone or email.

2019 and 2020 Overdue Taxes Tax Sale Processing Deadline

Municipal taxes for 2020 were due on October 30th, 2020. If you happened to miss this deadline and also have 2019 taxes still owing on your property, your property with incur tax sale costs.

For all rate payers who have 2019 and 2020 taxes owing, a letter was issued stating which properties are owing for 2019 including arrears and penalties. This amount is due by Friday, February 26, 2021. Commencing March 1, 2021, tax sale costs will be added to your property as well as monthly penalties until tax sale date or until 2019 taxes have been paid in full.

Safely Dispose Needles and Syringes with Sharps Containers

Sharps are <u>not recyclable</u> and they <u>do not belong in household waste</u>. When you dispose of sharps incorrectly, it can cause serious health risks to many people, including members of our public works team who collect curbside waste. To ensure the safety of everyone, we ask that all used needles and other sharps are immediately disposed of into a proper sharp disposal container. This reduces the risks of needle sticks, punctures and cuts from loose sharps. If you do not have a proper sharp disposal container, you can dispose of your sharps at the Gladstone Pharmacy.



Municipal 101

Your Guide to Local Government

Council provides guidance and sets the standards for the services and administration within the Municipality of WestLake-Gladstone. These are people who love the communities, and take the needs of ratepayers into consideration when making decisions.

The four primary responsibilities of Council are:

- 1. Decision making: Making fair decisions based on discussion and a majority vote. Decisions take into consideration the expressed concerns of the public, municipal policy, research/info gathered at public hearings.
- 2. Governance: Passing local by-laws and developing policies. Policies and by-laws provide consistent guidance and for staff and the public on matters such as taxation, street lights and protective services. Public input is welcomed and valued when it comes to proposing by-laws and policies.
- 3. Representation: Council members are democratically elected rate payers. They listen and engage with the public, and serve interests of the municipality as a whole.
- 4. Stewardship: Council strategically plans for the future, and makes sure resources and finances are being used responsibly.

Every council member must comply with the Council Code of Conduct and avoid conflicts of interest. If you have an issue that can be solved on the municipal level, take it up with Council. In our next newsletter, we will take a closer look at Conflict of Interest requirements.

Gladstone Swimming Pool also received a grant from Manitoba Coalition for Safer Waters to purchase a spinal board and other equipment. Do I Need A Building Permit?

What is a building permit?

A building permit is a document that provides legal authorization to begin construction of any type of building or structure.

Why is a Building Permit Required?

A building permit is required in order to protect the health and safety of the public. After the application is filed the Assistant CAO and Building Inspector review the project design <u>before</u> construction begins to ensure compliance with Building Codes and Zoning By-Law regulations. A **Development** Permit is required for any change in land use or site development.

Permits REQUIRED for

- Finishing unfinished spaces in a home (basement, attics, etc.)
- Repairing of foundations
- Installation of Wood Stoves or Fireplaces
- Installation of pools holding over 24 in. water
- Enclosure of an existing open deck
- Grain Bins and Machine Shops

- Construction of attached or detached garage or carport
- Demolition, removal or partial removal of buildings or structures
- Construction of open decks
- Construction of a detached accessory building

Permits NOT REQUIRED for

•

- Replacement of stucco, siding or shingles
- Replacement of doors when the opening is not enlarged or reduced in size
- Replacement of an open landing and stairs
- Construction of Fences (under 6 ft in rear 3ft in front)
- Patching, painting, decorating
- Installation of cabinets and shelves
